The Warren County Recycling Program is pleased to provide you with this Recycling and Disposal Guide. This guide is designed to help you determine how and where to properly dispose of or recycle common household items. By following principles of Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, we can all make a difference. Simple actions like purchasing products with less packaging and reusing them as much as possible can significantly reduce waste. Donating items you no longer need to local charitable organizations, such as the Salvation Army Thrift Store <https://satruck.org/>, (908-269-8555), the Habitat for Humanity ReStore <https://www.warrenhabitat.org/shop/> (908-835-1980), also play an important role.

Warren County's goal is to recycle 50% of all waste in order to preserve landfill space, and conserve our natural resources. To help with this, the guide is organized into two sections. The first outlines various recycling events and drop-off locations available to the public. The second details individual items, explaining how to prepare and properly dispose of or recycle them.

When improper items are included in the recycling stream, processing equipment must be halted to remove contaminants, leading to costly delays and inefficiencies. This guide aims to provide clear information to ensure only acceptable materials are recycled correctly, supporting a more sustainable future.

If you encounter an item not listed in the guide, please refer the websites provided, contact your local hauler, or reach out to the Warren County Recycling Program at (908) 475-6533 for further assistance. Together, we can work toward a cleaner, greener community.

ITEM	EXAMPLES OF ACCEPTABLE ITEMS	HOW TO PREPARE
CARDBOARD	Corrugated cardboard, boxes, brown paper grocery bags, cereal boxes, non-wax coated food containers, tissue boxes, shoe boxes, clean corrugated pizza boxes, and egg cartons.	FLATTEN BOXES. Discard Styrofoam and other packing material in trash. Trash packing material includes waxed items and frozen food boxes, milk and juice containers, and plastic egg cartons.
GLASS (containers only)	Bottles and Jars of all colors with labels.	Rinse clean. Pour loose recycling into the recycling bin. No bagged recycling.
METAL (Containers Only)	Aluminum, Tin, Steel, and Bimetal Containers ONLY.	Rinse clean, may leave metal lids on. This EXCLUDES aerosol cans containing product, aluminum foil and pie plates, and cooking pots and pans. Deposit acceptable recycling into recycling bin; DO NOT BAG.
PAPER	Newspapers, including inserts, junk mail, magazines, phone books, copy/office paper, envelopes with or without windows, paperback books, catalogs, store fliers, file folders, greeting cards, and non-metallic wrapping paper.	Clean only. Newspapers must be removed from the plastic film weather bag.
PLASTIC (Containers ONLY)	Bottles, Jars & Tubs with a #1 #2 #3 #4 #5 #6 and #7 in the Recycling Triangle such as Beverage, Milk, Detergent, Shampoo, Margarine & Yogurt.	Rinse clean. Dispose lids in trash. This EXCLUDES containers that held motor oil, pesticides, or hazardous chemicals.

PLACE THESE ITEMS IN THE TRASH OR DONATE WHEN PRACTICAL

Aerosol Cans containing product, Alkaline Batteries, Ceramics, China, Coat Hangers, Flower Pots, Food Trays, Garden Hoses, Glue Containers, Mirror Glass, Latex Paint (thoroughly dried out in cans), Mugs, Pictures, Pipe, Plastic Bags*, Plastic Pots, Porcelain, Pyrex, Rope, Shredded Paper, String, Styrofoam, Textiles, Tissue, Twine, Vases, Window Glass, Used and Soiled Items.

*Plastic Bags – Look for plastic bag collection containers at your local stores or put them in the trash. Do not place plastic bags at curbside recycling (bags will cause malfunctions in recycling machinery.)

CONVENIENCE CENTER

- Pickup truck or car loads of debris (i.e. wood, shingles, carpeting, furniture, household trash, etc.) will be accepted at the Convenience Center.
- No Commercially plated or lettered vehicles allowed such as business, U-Haul or other rental trucks/vehicles
- Vehicle maximum weight of 9,000 pounds
- All trailers (including rentals) are allowed with maximum combined (vehicle and trailer) inbound weight of less than 16,000 pounds
- Items brought in this manner will be weighed and incur charges at the current disposal rate plus all applicable taxes.
- Payment for disposal must be in the form of cash, Visa, MasterCard, Discover or American Express ONLY.

Are you a Wishful Recycler?

Wishful recyclers toss the wrong items into curbside recycling bins hoping they will be recycled. Poor recycling can cause contamination and wreak havoc on recycling processes.

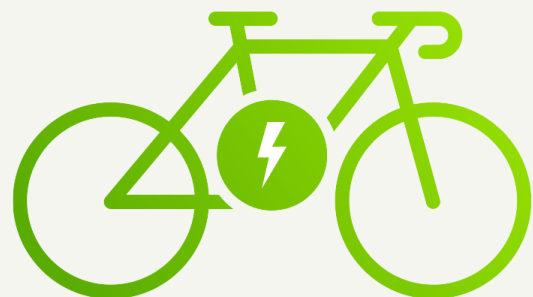

Automobile/SUV sizes - without rims up to size 22"	\$ 3.00 each

Tires must be off rim and be free from debris such as rocks, oil, dirt, ropes, chains or other matter or they will be rejected. Loads must be under 20 tires. Warren County Residents ONLY – No Businesses. No tractor trailer tires or farm equipment tires will be accepted. See page 15 for large tractor trailer or farm-size tire options.



Medicines

Individuals may submit medicines in their original container and use marker to cross out names and then place medicine in clear plastic bag with the name of medications on the bag. If no disposal instructions are given on the prescription drug labeling and no take-back program is available in your area, throw the drugs in the household trash following these steps:

1. Remove them from their original containers and mix them with an undesirable substance, such as used coffee grounds, dirt or kitty litter (this makes the drug less appealing to children and pets, and unrecognizable to people who may intentionally go through the trash seeking drugs).
2. Place the mixture in a sealable bag, empty can or other container to prevent the drug from leaking or breaking out of a garbage bag.
3. Scratch out all identifying information on the prescription label to make it unreadable. This will help protect your identity and the privacy of your personal health information.

4. Place bottles in an opaque container like a yogurt container and secure the lid, or wrap in dark colored plastic bag and hide the container in the trash. Do not recycle.
5. Do not give your medicine to friends. Doctors prescribe medicines based on your specific symptoms and medical history. Something that works for you could be dangerous for someone else.
6. When in doubt about proper disposal, ask your pharmacist. **Never flush medications down the toilet or dispose of in the sink.**

SAFE SYRINGE DISPOSAL FOR HOME GENERATED MEDICAL WASTE

Follow these steps to safely dispose of your syringes in your municipal trash. Your syringes must be placed in rigid containers that will protect people from needle sticks and use containers that are unlikely to break open on its way to the final disposal site.

1. Rigid Container - You may use empty laundry detergent bottles or 2-liter soda bottles or other rigid containers with screw-on caps to dispose of needles and syringes. Check with a pharmacy. Ask if it sells commercial containers specially designed to hold sharps for disposal in your household trash.

2. Label/Warning - Place a large label with a warning on the empty container. **Example: SYRINGES - DO NOT RECYCLE**

3. Clip the needle - You can buy an inexpensive hand held needle clipper from the pharmacy. **Using anything other than a clipper to break a needle is not safe.** After clipping the needle, carefully place each of your used needles and syringes into a plastic bottle with a screw-on lid. To the extent practicable, the individual receiving the medical treatment should clip the needle and syringe and place them in the container. In cases where this cannot be done due to the limitations of that individual, a family care giver or volunteer must perform this activity, it is recommended that the individual's physician be consulted first.

4. Seal - Seal the bottle tightly with its original lid and wrap duct tape over the lid after you fill the bottle with syringes.

5. Disposal - You may now dispose of the tightly sealed full container of syringes in your household garbage - **NOT** in your recycling bin. Remember, although you may feel healthy, your used syringes can transmit germs. In addition, loose syringes thrown in your trash can seriously hurt people. We all benefit from the safe disposal of syringes. Please do your part to help keep our environment clean and safe.

Reuse Opportunities

It has often been said that one person's trash is another person's treasure. Instead of discarding unwanted items, try donating or selling them. Not only will you be reducing waste, you'll be helping others. Local churches, community centers, thrift stores, schools, nonprofit organizations and other organizations may accept a variety of donated items. Check out the reuse opportunities below and look for additional opportunities in your area.

Architectural Items – Recycling the Past, Inc. is an architectural salvage company that specializes in architectural salvage for the home and garden. This company might be interested in architectural items that you no longer want or need. www.recyclingthepast.com

Bicycles – Pedals for Progress accepts donations of used bicycles which are then shipped to developing countries where they are used for basic transportation, and as a resource for school and community programs. www.p4p.org

Binders – Many schools will accept donations of used binders. Check with your local school district.

Books – Most libraries will accept donations of books. Many schools will also accept donations of books. Stores that sell used books might also be interested in the books that you no longer want or need. <https://www.warrenhabitat.org/shop/restore-shop-items/>

New Legacy Books is an organization that collects used books in New Jersey through a donation bin system. Books will be resold to individuals that can give the books a new home at the same time raising funds for organizations in the community. www.newlegacybooks.com

Boxes (Corrugated Cardboard) - In an effort to reduce waste, U-Haul's Box Exchange program helps customers sell, give away, or find used corrugated cardboard boxes. www.uhaul.com/Exchange

Bras

- The Bra Recyclers, based in Arizona, collect unwanted bras and donates them to women's shelters. The company receives 4,000 bras per month and supplies more than 40 shelters around the country. <https://thebrarecyclers.com/>
- I Support the Girls is a nonprofit organization that accepts donations of new and gently used bras which are then distributed to girls and women experiencing homelessness. isupportthegirls.org

Bricks – Old bricks that are still in good shape can be cleaned up and reused. Check with local recyclers of construction and demolition waste or architectural salvage companies to see if they would be interested in your old bricks for sale as reclaimed bricks. Building Materials – Habitat for Humanity's ReStores are retail establishments that sell quality used and surplus building materials at reduced prices. Building materials sold at ReStores are donated by building supply stores, contractors, demolition crews and the general public. www.habitat.org/restores

Clothes – Goodwill Industries International, Inc. and the Salvation Army both accept used clothing donations. <http://www.goodwill.org/donate-and-shop/> and www.salvationarmyusa.org.

Consignment shops are stores that sell secondhand items (typically clothing and accessories) on behalf of the original owner, who receives a percentage of the selling price. Search online for consignment shops near you.

Compact Discs - Most libraries will accept donations of used CDs. Check with your local library.

DVDs - Most libraries will accept donations of used DVDs. Check with your local library.

Eyeglasses – Lions Clubs International

Lions Clubs International operates a network of collection boxes and Lions Eyeglass Recycling Centers, where volunteers process donated glasses for distribution through medical missions around the world. <https://www.lionsclubs.org/en/resources-for-members/resource-center/recycle-eyeglasses>

Industrial Items – repurposedMATERIALS, Inc. accepts industrial byproducts and waste streams and “repurposes” these items, giving them a second life with a new use. Examples: retired street sweeping brushes are repurposed as backscratchers for horses or cattle; billboard vinyl is repurposed as tarps, covers and liners; and rubber conveyor belts are repurposed as fencing and industrial flooring. www.repurposedmaterialsinc.com/index.php?p=home

Kitchens (Luxury) – Renovation Angel is an organization that will help you donate your old luxury kitchen for reuse purposes as you undergo a renovation on your kitchen. <https://auroracirc.com/pages/renovation-angel-landing-page>

Medical Equipment – Goodwill Home Medical Equipment collects, sanitizes, refurbishes and sells gently-used, durable medical equipment and unopened medical supplies at affordable prices. www.goodwillhomemedical.org

Miscellaneous Items

- Charitable organizations may be interested in miscellaneous items that you no longer want or need (example, toys). Check with local charitable organizations before putting usable items in the trash.
- Freecycle is a grassroots and nonprofit movement of people who are giving (and getting) stuff for free in their own towns and neighborhoods via an online exchange. It's all about reuse and keeping good stuff out of landfills. Each local group is moderated by local volunteers. Membership is free. www.freecycle.org

Office Furniture – Office furniture (desks, chairs, filing cabinets, etc.) that is old and no longer wanted, but still usable, can be donated to and reused by other organizations in need of such items. Check with local nonprofit organizations to see if there is any interest in your old office furniture.

Paint – Leftover paint that is in good condition can be donated to: friends and relatives who admire the color schemes of your home; community groups, such as churches, schools and non-profit organizations

that are involved with community housing projects; and artist groups that create murals or do painting projects. You can also sell or donate your leftover paint through a garage sale or on free online sites.

Pallets (Wood) – Wood pallets that are broken can be repaired and reused. Check with local pallet companies about reuse opportunities. Many wood pallet recycling companies also repair and reuse old pallets. Such companies can be found on the NJDEP’s database of Class B recycling centers at www.nj.gov/dep/dshw/lrm/classb.htm.

Polystyrene Packing “Peanuts” – Consumers can drop off polystyrene plastic packing “peanuts” at over 500 collection sites in the US. <https://www.pakmail.com/recycling-packingsupplies>

Sewing Machines - Pedals for Progress accepts donations of used sewing machines which are then shipped to developing countries where they become productive assets for the poor. The sewing machines are provided to non-profit vocational education programs, small businesses, community service programs and individuals. www.p4p.org

Shoes (Footwear) - Soles4Souls collects used shoes and distributes them to those in need free of charge. Over 10 million pairs of shoes have been reused and thus kept out of landfills. www.soles4souls.com

Sports Equipment – There are many organizations that are eagerly looking for donations of new or used sporting equipment. These non-profit organizations then distribute the donated sporting equipment to needy communities in the United States, as well as to developing countries in need of assistance.
